Richard Miller –

is the project officer for the Galloway Fisheries Trust www.gallowayfisheriestrust.org
Working on improvements to the River Bladnoch in South West Scotland. This river is a Special Area of Conservation on account that it is one of the few on Scotland's west coast that has a stock of spring-run Atlantic salmon.

Brian Davidson -

is the assistant director for the Association of Salmon Fishery Boards www.asfb.org.uk
The ASFB represent, co-ordinate and promote the interests of Scottish salmon and sea trout fisheries and generally to take such steps as may be desirable for the protection, preservation and development of salmon fisheries of Scotland. The ASFB is the lead partner in the CASS project

Edwin Third -

is a bailiff with the Dee District Salmon Fishery Board (DDSFB) www.dsfa.org
The DDSFB are the partner in the CASS project taking on the largest number of actions, with an extensive programme of improvement works including fencing, riparian woodland management and barrier removal/ fish pass installation. As well as his duties for fishery protection on the Dee, Edwin plays a key role in the delivery of the CASS actions.

Roger Knight –

is the recently appointed Director of the Spey Fishery Board (SFB) www.speyfisheryboard.com
The SFB's actions within the CASS project are largely focussed on improving fish access at a number of known man-made barriers.

Steven Hawkins –

is a bailiff for the Esk District Salmon Fishery Board (EDSFB).
The River South Esk is a relatively small east-coast river, designated a Special Area of Conservation for its freshwater pearl mussel populations but also for its salmon. CASS LIFE actions in this area are aiming to stabilise the banks across a large area of the upper catchment and reduce silt inputs resulting from bank erosion and overgrazing by livestock. In addition to his duties for fishery protection, Steve plays a key role in the delivery of the CASS actions on the South Esk

James Hunt –

is the assistant biologist with the Tweed Foundation www.rtc.org.uk
The River Tweed is Scotland's most productive salmon fishery and also a Special Area of Conservation. James is involved in a number of fishery management activities and is leading on the CASS action in the catchment, namely modification to fish pass and installing a fish counter.
